

Pastor's Message

Happy Pride Month to our LGBTQIA+ Siblings in Christ!



From the Global Board of Church & Society of The United Methodist Church:

"Since 2000, the United States recognizes June as LGBT Pride Month. The month was chosen In memory of the 1969 riots at Stonewall Inn in Manhattan, widely considered one of the touchstones for the history of the LGBTQ rights movement.

In the midst of such festivities, however, this month also marks continued struggle for the protection of LGBTQ rights. According to the United Nations, 76 countries criminalize consensual same sex relationships and in seven countries the penalty may be death. Bullying and threats of violence against persons who are, or are perceived to be, LGBTQ contribute to cultures of fear and shame...

As a church we 'deplore acts of hate and violence against groups or persons based on ... sexual orientation [or] gender identity.' (Social Principles, ¶162). We seek that every person is recognized and seen as valued."

In 2020, my spouse and I were leading a virtual Pride worship service for the churches we served. We used liturgy and music written by persons who are part of the LGBTQIA+ (Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, Queer/Questioning, Intersex, Asexual, and more) community. We decided to introduce ourselves using our pronouns and by naming our sexual orientation. Right before worship went live, I turned to my spouse and said, "ok so I will say my pronouns are she/her and that I am straight?" I paused for a moment and then said, "but wait, that doesn't really feel…right." My spouse looked at me, laughed, and said, "well we are going live so you have two whole minutes to figure out your identity!" After some soul searching and processing, I realized after that Pride service, that I was not straight, and had never actually been straight, but straight had always just been the default.

I am bisexual+ meaning that I am attracted to persons of my same gender and other genders.

You might hear me use shorthand and say "I'm queer" which is a term that was derogatory that many people in the LGBTQIA+ community have reclaimed as their identity and made it a positive word. My spouse, John (they/them), is non-binary (which falls under the trans umbrella) and is also bisexual+.

I share this with you because as someone who often "passes as straight," I recognize that I have a lot of privilege I can use to help folks in the LGBTQIA+ community, especially within the church. I also share this because I am PROUD of who I am and I think it is so important as a person of faith to live authentically as God created me. So thank you for loving me for me, and for welcoming my queer family with open arms. May we celebrate and work for justice not just during Pride month, but every day for all beloved children of God.



What's Happening in the UMC?

About 30 people stayed after church on Sunday, May 21 for an information session about the churches that are disaffiliating from the United Methodist Church. Pastor Annie started with an explanation of the structure and hierarchy of the church and then delved into the recent developments stemming from divisiveness of the language in the *Book of Discipline of the United Methodist Church* stating that "the United Methodist Church does not condone the practice of homosexuality and considers this practice incompatible with Christian teaching." (¶ 161G)

Pastor Annie provided a hand-out of FAQs regarding disaffiliation in the UMC. Copies of the handout are available in the church office. Here is a summary what we learned:

- What does disaffiliation mean?
 ¶ 2553. Disaffiliation of a Local Church Over Issues Related to Human Sexuality.
 Because of the current deep conflict within The United Methodist Church around issues of human sexuality, a local church shall have a limited right, under the provisions of this paragraph, to disaffiliate from the denomination for reasons of conscience regarding a change in the requirements and provisions of the Book of Discipline related to the practice of homosexuality or the ordination or marriage of self-avowed practicing homosexuals as resolved and adopted by the 2019 General Conference, or the actions or inactions of its annual conference related to these issues which follow.
- At New England Annual Conference 2022, four churches disaffiliated from the UMC. This year, at NEAC 2023, there is legislation for 14 more churches requesting to disaffiliate from the UMC. **St. James UMC does not have plans for disaffiliation.**
- In 2022, The New England Conference of the UMC adopted a resolution called "The New England Declaration" which states that the NEAC declares itself to be rooted and structured in God's unconditional love that leads to liberation, freedom, and full inclusion of all. The NEAC is committed to dismantling individual and systemic injustice, oppression, and discrimination including in the structures and actions of our denomination.






Fisher Cats Baseball Faith & Family Night Saturday, July 15


