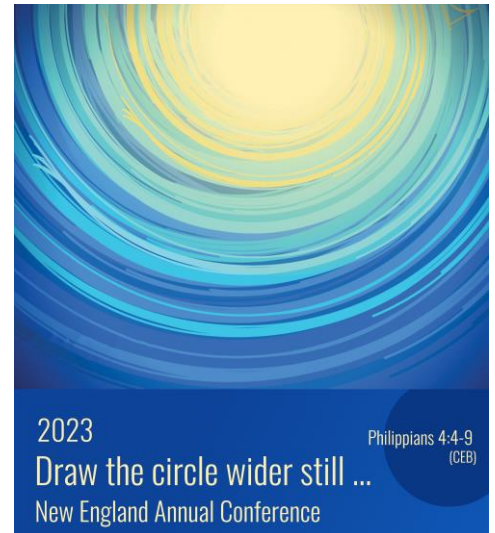

Pastor's Message

Pastor Annie's Recap from New England Annual Conference 2023

The Holy Spirit was indeed moving as we gathered in Manchester, NH for NEAC 2023 to “draw the circle wider still.” I, along with Cheryl Barb (Lay Leader and Lay Delegate to AC), Dave Jenkins (SPRC Chair and Lay Equalization Member), and Joyce Hawkins (Clothes Closet Director and Lay Equalization Member) spent three days in amazing worship, fellowship, holy conversations, and doing the important business of the NEAC.



Business Highlights of NEAC:

- 14 churches disaffiliated from the UMC
- The 7 part-time district administrative assistant positions will become four full-time positions with the title Regional Administrator.
 - Phyllis Riviere — Granite and Green Mountain districts
 - Lori Umberhind — Katahdin and Many Waters districts
 - Allyson Printz — Commonwealth East and West districts
 - The fourth position, covering the Seacoast District and providing support to the Director of Connectional Ministries, has not yet been filled.
- 9 persons were ordained, 8 persons were commissioned (provisionally ordained), 14 persons were licensed as local pastors, 11 persons were certified as lay ministers, and 1 person was commissioned as a home-missioner
- Grace Pugh Hubbard will serve as Conference Climate Coordinator, a part-time position, helping churches be more responsible stewards of the environment and leading advocacy efforts. New England is the only UMC Conference to have a staff person dedicated to the work of climate justice.

Trustees: A Look Back and a Look Forward

In addition to overseeing the everyday management of the church and parsonage facilities, the Board of Trustees also manage the repairs and renovations. We have been very fortunate to use donations to cover many of the projects. In addition to the volunteer work of our members, we have had some outstanding contractors. (See the listing in this newsletter.) Here is a look back at some of the improvements made in the last four years.

Parlor Area: Shortly before the Covid-19 shut-down, we began renovations on the parlor area. The parlor itself received a new coat of paint, new carpeting, and chairs. The parlor kitchen had a complete make-over including new cabinets, plumbing, flooring and paint. The choir robe room was painted and reconfigured with a new file cabinet. One of the bathrooms was also completely renovated with a new vanity, toilet and flooring.

Parsonage Repairs: Extensive work had to be done at the parsonage due to leaks. Insurance money was used for all of the repairs to the garage and cellar areas.

Undercroft: Unfortunately, leaky pipes forced the renovation of the undercroft. Insurance money was used in this area. Thanks to the dedicated work of volunteers, the remaining insurance money was used to fund other projects.

Sanctuary Windows: Due to generous donations, we were able to replace the sanctuary windows, a project that had started several years ago.

Production Room: With the help of a grant and matching funds, the production room was created in the former worship closet. Equipment was relocated from the balcony. New equipment and electrical work were completed to enhance our online capabilities.

Roof: Perhaps the most visible improvement is the new roof on the sanctuary and office wing. Thanks to our predecessors, we had funds at the United Methodist Foundation to cover most of this expense. Insurance money remaining from the undercroft was used to cover the rest of the cost.

Office Hallway: The office hallway flooring had become a safety issue with tiles that had lifted. The new flooring is the result of donations.

Lighting: You may not realize that improvements and updates to all of our lighting have been a priority. First, all bathrooms now have motion activated lighting. The sanctuary chandelier bulbs were all replaced with LED bulbs and light switches were repaired. Most recently, all of the lighting in the Fellowship Hall Building and the Office Wing has been replaced. This project was made affordable due to the results of an energy audit.

Other Repairs and Improvements: Other less visible items include faucet repairs, a new hot water heater, a renovated Trustee closet, and a new refrigerator and dishwasher at the parsonage. Some excavating work was done on the far side of the church to improve drainage in that area.

What's next?

With safety in mind, the Trustees are planning to add a railing to the stairs leading from the office wing to the Fellowship Hall. The barn will receive a fresh coat of stain. Some thermostats will be replaced before the weather changes this fall. We are also looking into grants for some larger projects. If you have any questions or suggestions, please see a Trustee. Outreach Team will Collect School Supplies

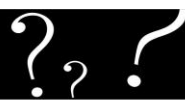
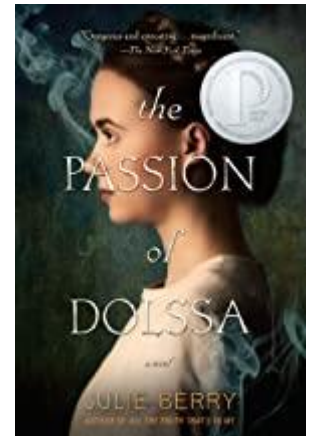

Bishop urges us to open our circles

Bishop Peggy A. Johnson spoke on this year's theme—particularly the challenges we face when we try to "draw our circles wider still."

From Acts 1:6-9, Bishop Johnson referred to Jesus' words as "no little mission statement." She said, "Jesus called them to be witnesses locally (in Jerusalem), in the suburbs (Judea), to the neighbors that they didn't much get along with (Samaria), and to the ends of the earth (the entire world)."

Another type of circle is a silo—which Bishop Johnson not only spoke about, but brought to the stage with her. The barriers created by silos "keep some in and some out by design," she said. "It is safer that way. It keeps control that way."

"Our silos of committees, theological cliques, former conference affiliations, silos of old hurts over all of that, our silos of who decides what, all that human interpersonal stuff, is our biggest

Members draw the circle at the end of the 2023 AC session on Saturday

In this session, members addressed matters not only of the Annual Conference, but petitions headed for the 2024 General Conference, including measures to divest from fossil fuels, allow the course of study to be taken fully online and to address justice concerns in Israel-Palestine.

Some highlights of the measures adopted:

Members approved a reorganization of the Connectional Table to serve as "the center and coordination hub of the Conference ministry in between sessions of the Annual Conference."

The restructuring of Conference staff was also announced.

The seven part-time district administrative assistant positions are now four full-time positions with the title Regional Administrator as follows:

Lori Umberhind — Katahdin and Many Waters districts

Allyson Printz — Commonwealth East and West districts

Members unanimously elected Clare J. Chapman as Treasurer/CFO and Director of Administrative Services.

Members approved without discussion the 2024 Conference budget of \$7,199,581.

The Annual Conference approved two measures, RS-23-2014 and RS-23-2015, focused on Black churches – to help address inequities in funding and cancel debt.

The Annual Conference approved the formation of a Covenant Hills Visioning Team to develop a plan for the Cabot, VT, camp property.

Members approved creation of a new interim Ethnic Local Church Concerns Committee.

The Vision Forward Team continued its work providing a roadmap for the next year, which includes the development of detailed plans around the "provocative proposals" and create a comprehensive playbook for "living into the Beloved Community where local churches and individuals are empowered and equipped."

The body approved a substitute motion for RS-23-221 that called for all

the disaffiliation resolutions to be taken as one motion. Members approved the disaffiliation of the 14 churches that requested to do so. The churches have to complete the paperwork and financial requirements outlined in their agreements to finalize the disaffiliations. The deadline is Dec. 31, 2023.

Annual Conference honored retirees, newly licensed local pastors, the new Certified Lay Ministers and commissioned a new Home Missioner.

The Board of Church & Society honored two laity with the Bryant Award honors excellence in social justice actions as a way of lifting up the commitment of United Methodism to such endeavors.

This year's honorees are Jan Demers and David Troughton. Each received a certificate and a \$500 donation to the nonprofit with which they work.

The Board also presents the Wilbur C. Ziegler Award for Excellence in Preaching.

The Rev. Dr. Becca Girrell received, who serves, United Community Church of Morrisville, VT, is this year's honoree.

challenge," Bishop Johnson said. "Silos are keeping us from new ways of doing things: cross committee work, sharing of resources, ... cooperative parishes."

As she opened the silos on the stage: "I challenge you to take up the work of opening up your circles ... When you do that, the circle can open up and there is no end to the wider still things that can happen in New England."

Sprinkle and split

A sprinkle of pepper and a dab of soap illustrate a big concept from God's Word.



What you need:

- Shallow dish
- Water
- Black ground pepper
- Toothpick
- Dish soap
- Bible

What you do:

1. With the dish on a table, fill it halfway with water. Don't jiggle the dish.
2. Sprinkle pepper on the water.
3. Dab the toothpick into a drop of soap. Then touch its tip to the center of the water and observe.
4. Read Psalm 103:8-12.
How does this experiment illustrate God's forgiveness?
5. Explain the science behind this experiment: The soap disturbs the water's surface tension. The soap molecules don't want to interact with the water. This repels the water molecules from the soap, causing the floating pepper to also move to the sides.

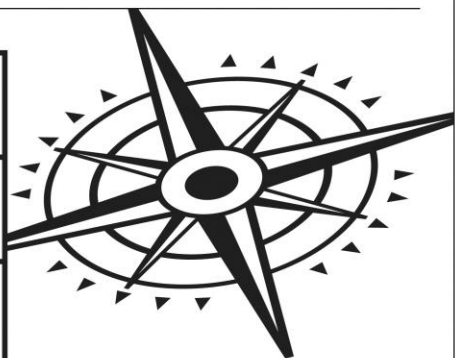
