

Pastor's Message

And I heard a loud voice from the throne saying,

"See, the home of God is among mortals.

God will dwell with them;

I don't know about you, but every year I make New Year's Resolutions at the end of December or beginning of January and by February I've already "failed." There is so much pressure to "be better", "do more", "be healthier", "accomplish more", and "be successful". So I am here to say that if you are feeling yourself in that space of failure or shame or guilt over impossible and improbable resolutions you made, welcome to the club...we have cookies!

The real point I'm trying to make here is that we are human. We are messes. We succeed AND we fail. In the words of Miss Frizzle from the kid's show *The Magic Schoolbus*, "let's make mistakes and get messy!" We put on this false mask that somehow this year will be different; that magically our humanness won't show up and life won't get in the way. This is what we remember during Ash Wednesday and the season of Lent: that we are HUMAN, we are messy and full of mistakes, we aren't perfect, and we aren't God (thank God). Through this yearly ritual and practice we are reminded that we are dust and to dust we shall return. It's like a big reality check that we need every single year. Oh yeah, I'm human.

This year Ash Wednesday falls on Valentine's Day which at first seems really odd. Let's mark this holiday of love by going to church and being told we are human and we are going to die...sounds so fun! And while it might not be as fun as going out on a dinner date with your loved one, I actually think the irony of the two holidays being on the same day is perfect and so very human. Because our daily human lives are not all completely happy Valentine's Days and they are not all solemn Ash Wednesdays, but rather a bit of both and all the in-betweens.


Theologian Frederick Beuchner wrote, "Here is the world. Beautiful and terrible things will happen. Do not be afraid." There is so much truth to that and so much truth to the human messiness of two "opposite" holidays falling on the same day. So my prayer for you as we embark on this Lenten Season is that you let go of the guilt of failed resolutions and the facade of perfection, so that you may embrace your authentic messy, beautiful humanness. After all, that's what God does with us each and every day.

Bishop Announces Cabinet Change

January 21, 2024

Bishop Peggy Johnson is pleased to announce the appointment of the Rev. Dr. Jackie Brannen as the interim District Superintendent of the Granite District. Her appointment will be from July 1, 2024 to June 30, 2025.

With the transition in episcopal leadership happening in September 2024, Bishop Johnson is making this an interim appointment to give the new bishop an opportunity to assess the needs of the districts and choose a new superintendent. This will also allow the Cabinet and Conference greater flexibility in 2025. "I am so grateful to Jackie for her willingness to return to the Cabinet at this critical time in the life of our Church," said Bishop Johnson. "This interim appointment will offer the Granite District a leader with experience and a pastoral heart while allowing the next bishop to make important decisions about the Conference's future leadership."

Dr. Brannen will follow Rev. Taesung Kang, who will be completing seven years of ministry as the District Superintendent in the Granite District. He will begin serving as the pastor of the South UMC in Manchester, Connecticut beginning July 1, 2024.

An elder in the New England Conference, Dr. Brannen served for 19 years before retiring in 2023. She served local churches throughout New Hampshire and Maine in addition to serving as Katahdin District Superintendent. She is currently serving the First United Methodist Church of Portsmouth, NH.

She is a spiritual director with a passion for helping folks connect with God. Dr. Brannen, her grandson Matthew and her two beloved Yorkies live at Wesley by the Sea, the Preachers' Aid Society community for retired clergy in Wells, ME. She loves to travel, read, and write.

Dr. Brannen said, "While my retirement plan had not originally included serving once again as a District Superintendent, I am thrilled to be able to serve God and the churches and people of New Hampshire, where I grew up and began my ministry."

Please join us in praying for Dr. Brannen and Rev. Taesung Kang and their families, the congregations of First UMC and South UMC and the entire Granite District during this time of transition.





No Wednesday Book Study During Lent





Dine Out Club

The Dine Out Club is a donation-based meal program for anyone 60 and older, with a suggested donation of \$4.00 per meal.* After registering, you will receive a Dine Out Club card which can be used for meals from a specially curated menu. Menus comply with the Older Americans Act standards by providing one-third of the Recommended Dietary Allowances for adults.

Partnered restaurants are the Village Eatery in Merrimack, the White Birch Eatery in Goffstown and Francoeur's Café in Manchester. You may use your card up to 8 times per month. On the first day of each month, 8 new meals will be available to you. Meals do not carry over month-to-month. Dine Out Club cards that have not been used for 90 days will be deactivated.

Register at hcmow.org/dineoutclub or take an application from the envelope on the bulletin board in the office hallway.

New applications, replacement cards, or requests for cards to be reactivated may take up to 8 weeks to process due to the programs tremendous popularity.

*For your convenience, the restaurants have wall mounted donation boxes for cash and checks. You can also mail donations to P.O. Box 910 Merrimack, NH 03054 or on the website hcmow.org/dineoutclub. No eligible person will be denied a card based on their inability to contribute.

VITA/TCE Program Offers Free Tax Preparation Services to



Qualified Taxpayers

Free tax preparation services are available starting in early February 2024 for Greater Nashua residents through a partnership led by United Way of Greater Nashua, the IRS and other community partners and volunteers.

Tax preparation will be done by trained and IRScertified volunteers at four sites in Nashua and Hudson.

All sites require that the taxpayer schedule an appointment in advance to have their return processed. Details on how to make an appointment for each site, along with dates and times when the sites will be open, is included at right.

Those wishing to have their taxes prepared by the volunteers are asked to have all their documents available when making their appointment. Information on which documents are needed are listed at the bottom of IRS Form 3676-B located at https://www.irs.gov/pub/irs-pdf/p3676bsp.pdf

Volunteers have been trained to assist taxpayers for both the VITA (Volunteer Income Tax Assistance) and the TCE (Tax Counseling for the Elderly)

Programs. They will assist taxpayers in identifying any credits (Earned Income Tax Credit, Child Tax Credit, etc.) they may be entitled to.

The VITA Program offers free help to people who generally earn \$64,000 or less, people with disabilities and limited English-speaking taxpayers. The TCE Program is generally for people aged 60 or older and focuses on tax issues unique to seniors. While there is no income limit on TCE prepared returns, priority is given to low-to-moderate income households. The sites in Nashua and Hudson can prepare tax returns for both programs.

IRS Form 3676-B also contains information on the specific types of returns the trained volunteers are able (or not able) to process in the VITA and TCE programs; please refer to this list to see if you qualify.

Pre-Lenten webinar topic is 'ableism'


Bishop Peggy A. Johnson invites the laity and clergy of the New England Conference to a Pre-Lenten webinar focused on "ableism" at 7 pm on Monday, Feb. 12, 2024.

Like racism and sexism, ableism is a bias; in this case against people with disabilities. There is much we in the church can do to improve our outreach and inclusion of people with disabilities.

The evening, which is sponsored by the Conference Commission on Religion and Race and Conference Disabilities Committee, will begin with a short devotional followed by a presentation by Rev. Justin and Dr. Lisa Hancock.


The Hancocks are co-founders of The Julian Way (https:// thejulianway.org/), an organization focused on empowerment and discipleship with, for, and by persons with disabilities.

Justin is the Lead Instigator of The Julian Way and spends his days en-



gaging with the members of The Julian Way through one-on-one discipleship and advocating with the church and the wider community for the integration and participation of disabled persons.

Lisa is the Director of Worship Arts for Discipleship Ministries, an agency of The United Methodist Church where she writes liturgy and creates resources to help local churches engage in and make disciples through worship.



Fourteen churches complete disaffiliation process

As of Jan. 11, 2024, Director of Administrative Ministries Kerry Patles reports that all churches that had been approved for disaffiliation by the Annual Conference in June 2023 had completed the process and made the required payments.

In 2023, 14 churches sought to disaffiliate under the provisions of Book of Discipline ¶2553. The total of disaffiliations under this paragraph in New England is 18 (see list at right). As of the last statistical report in Dec. 31, 2022, there were 561 churches in the Conference.

"As a connectional covenant community, the whole is most certainly affected when any part chooses to separate," said Bishop Peggy A. Johnson. "But we, as United Methodists in New England, trusted the discernment process. We acknowledge that we remain connected in Christ and

sought to engage in a process that was prayerful, offered grace, and minimized harm,"


